# **Functions of Economic Affairs Division**

Economic Affairs Division is the lead Division for mobilization of external financial resources from bilateral and multilateral development partners; promotion of economic relations with partner countries; management of public and publically guaranteed external debt; provision of technical assistance to friendly countries and signing of MoUs with local NGOs seeking foreign funding. The organogram of EAD is at (Annex-I).

# a. Main Objectives of the Ministry:

- i. To mobilize foreign economic assistance from multilateral & bilateral development partners for improving lives and livelihood of the masses of the country.
- ii. To manage public and publically guaranteed external debt.
- iii. To have economic consultations with partner countries for promotion of bilateral economic cooperation through trade, investment and financial assistance.
- iv. To provide technical assistance to friendly countries.
- v. To sign MoUs with local NGOs seeking foreign funding.

# b. Core Functional Areas of Economic Affairs Division are:

# i. **Project Financing:**

- To arrange loans and grants from external sources for implementation of development projects.
- To conduct regular tripartite portfolio review meeting to monitor implementation progress of foreign funded development projects. These projects are implemented by relevant federal & provincial ministries and departments.

# ii. **Program Financing:**

- To arrange external financial resources for restructuring/ reforming the economy. These
  finances help government to support budgetary activities and balance of payments. It
  also helps Government to build external buffers and foreign exchange reserves of the
  country.
- Liaison with Finance Division to arrange program financing from multilateral development partners.

# iii. External Public Debt Management:

- To manage the centralized database of public and publically guaranteed external debt.
- Responsible for timely payments of debt servicing and retirement obligations.
- Coordination/ liaison with Finance Division pertaining to legal and policy mandate of public and publically guaranteed external debt.

# iv. Economic Consultations with Partner Countries:

- To establish bilateral economic relations with partner countries.
- To provide a platform for promotion of trade, investment and financial assistance. Also provide an opportunity to resolve disputes and barriers, if any.

# v. Signing of MoU with Local NGOs Seeking Foreign Funds:

- To process cases for signing of MoUs with local NGOs seeking foreign funding.
- To consult with relevant stakeholders for clearance from security point of view.

# vi. Provision of Technical Assistance to Friendly Countries:

- To provide long term educational facilities to friendly countries in the disciplines of medical, dentistry, medicine and engineering.
- To offer short term training courses in the fields of banking & finance, railways and postal services.

# BILATERAL DEVELOPMENT PARTNERS

#### **CHINA**

Pakistan and China share a historic and strategic partnership, which has fostered and developed over the time. China is one of the most important and reliable Development Partner of Pakistan. China Wing processes, negotiates and arranges foreign economic assistance with China on favorable terms for the Government of Pakistan. China Wing is dealing with economic assistance from Government of People's Republic of China (China) and Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB).

- 2. Pak-China JEC was established in October 1982 with the purpose to review progress on bilateral protocols and agreements and explore possibilities of further strengthening development cooperation between the two sides. JEC is a high-level ministerial forum led by Economic Affairs Division and the Chinese Ministry of Commerce (MOFCOM). It has met fourteen times so far.
- 3. The Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) was established on 25 December, 2015 with the aim to provide financing support to developing countries in Asia and Pacific for infrastructure development to promote regional connectivity. Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for establishment of AIIB was signed by the Finance Minister on 24-10-2014 on behalf of the Government of Pakistan along with other Prospective Founding Members. Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) is a multilateral international bank established for financing support to developing countries for infrastructure development in order to promote regional connectivity in the Asia-Pacific region.

#### a. CURRENT PORTFOLIO AND MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS DURING FY 2018-19:

#### i. **China:**

China is providing economic assistance to Pakistan under loans, grants and technical cooperation in the shape of trainings to Government officers. China is also providing assistance to Pakistan under the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor which is being carried out between the two countries as per MOU signed between the Governments of Pakistan & China on 5<sup>th</sup> July, 2013. The fields of cooperation under CPEC include the connectivity through construction of Road & Railway Networks, Oil & Gas Pipelines, Fiber-Optics & Wireless Broadband Links between Western China and Pakistan, Industrial Park Construction / Economic Zones, Manufacturing and Energy Sectors; and strengthening of cooperation in Education, Culture, and Tourism & Media. China-Pakistan Economic Corridor is a collection of infrastructure projects that are currently under construction throughout Pakistan. This Division is involved in CPEC

project like KKH Phase-II (Thakot-Havellian), Peshawar Karachi Motorway, Orange Line, Construction of East Bay Expressway, New Gwadar International Airport Project, Gwadar Smart City Port Master Plan. A Joint Working Group on Socio Economic Development has been established to steer grant financing in six priority areas.

# ii. Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB):

Pakistan has appointed the Minister for Finance & Economic Affairs as the Governor and Secretary EAD as the Alternate Governor to the AIIB Board of Governors, while Joint Secretary, EAD holds the position of the Alternate Director of AIIB Board of Directors. AIIB has financed its first project of US\$ 100 million in Pakistan (M-4 Motorway Shorkot-Khanewal Section). Second project of Tarbella-V extension project of US\$ 300 million was signed on 18<sup>th</sup> Jan 2017. The details of the ongoing projects are at (**Annex-II-C**).

2. The following Agreements/Letter of Exchanges were signed with China:

3. There are 07 ongoing loan projects worth US\$ 6,764.5 million from Government of China (**Annex-II**). Three agreements on Economic and Technical Cooperation worth of RMB 4,000.0 million have been signed. Also, Letters of Exchange (LOEs) of three projects were signed during FY 2018-19 (**Annex-II-B**). Ten loans projects were under negotiation with the EXIM Bank China and AIIB during financial year 2018-19 (**Annex-II-D**).

#### b. Grant Agreements (FY 2018-19):

Three Agreements on Economic and Technical Cooperation Between the Government of the People's Republic of China and The Government of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan amounting to 4,000.0 million RMB were signed for the CPEC and Social Sector Area Project.

Under the agreements on Economic and Technical Cooperation Letters of Exchange (LoE) of three projects amounting to 203.3 million RMB were signed (Annex-II-A).

# c. Training Facilities under Technical Cooperation during 2018-19:

China offered fully funded 60 trainings courses including 09 Master Degree Programmes, 13 bilateral training programmes and 38 multilateral/ short term seminars for capacity building of public sector officials. More than 450 officers/technocrats from Government of Pakistan availed this opportunity in various disciplines.

#### **JAPAN**

Japan and Pakistan established diplomatic relations on 28<sup>th</sup> April, 1952. Since then Japan has also become an important bilateral development partner of Pakistan with a substantial development assistance portfolio. Japanese technical assistance was initiated in 1954, however, Official Development Assistance (ODA), was started in mode of loan in 1961 and in mode of grant in 1970. The various forms of assistance have contributed considerably in Pakistan's development over the years. Japan has remained one of the major source of economic assistance, a leading trading partner as well as an important provider of foreign investment for Pakistan.

2. Japan's ODA comprises Yen Loans, Project Grants/ Non Project Grant Aid (NPGA) and Technical Cooperation. Loan assistance is extended on soft terms for basic economic, social and infrastructure projects, thereby providing support to government efforts for poverty reduction and economic growth. Grant aid is provided for development projects and social sector activities including health, education, water management etc. Under technical cooperation programme, Government of Japan extends assistance in the shape of experts, equipment and trainings.

#### **Current Portfolio**

#### i. Yen Loans:

7 Projects are on-going with total loan assistance of JPY 85,772 million (equivalent to US\$ 720.71 million).

#### ii. Grants:

10 Grant Projects are on-going with a total of JPY 20,632 million (equivalent to US\$ 179.38 million) in various sector i.e. Water & Sanitation, Disaster Management, Counter Terrorism, Energy, Health and Education.

# iii. Grants in the shape of Scholarships:

2 grants projects in the shape of scholarships are on-going with a total of JPY 650 million (US\$ 5.92 million).

# b. Agreements signed during 2018-2019

#### i. Yen Loans 2018-19:

No yen loan signed.

#### ii. Grant Assistance 2018-19:

- a. Project for Installation of Weather Surveillance Radar in Multan City amounting to JPY 2042 million (US\$ 18.40 million) signed on 31<sup>st</sup> August 2019.
- b. Project for the Extension of Intensive Care at Maternal and Child Health Care Centre and Children's Hospital in PIMS amounting to JPY 3620 million (US\$ 32.40 million) signed on 23<sup>rd</sup> April, 2019.

# iii. Grants in the shape of Scholarships 2018-19:

Project for Human Resource Development Scholarship to JPY 328 million (US\$ 2.96 million) signed on 31st August, 2018.

# iv. Non-Project Grant Aid (in shape of equipments) 2018-19:

Project for Economic and Social Development Programme amounting to JPY 1900 million (US\$ 16.99 million) signed on 23<sup>rd</sup> April, 2019.

# v. **Technical Cooperation 2018-19:**

Technical Cooperation Programme signed on 30<sup>th</sup> April, 2005 between government of Pakistan and Government of Japan. Under this programme Government of Japan extends assistance in the shape of experts, equipment and trainings. 21 projects under Technical Cooperation are on-going. In addition, JICA offered 65 slots during 2018-19 for various short/long training courses for Government Officials.

# c. Request Survey for Technical Cooperation Projects 2018-19:

Under the Government of Japan's Request Survey for implementation of projects under Technical Cooperation Programme, three projects were considered under Category (approved status) by Government of Japan and are currently under the process of implementation.

# PARIS CLUB (PC)

Countries of the Paris Club are historic development partners of Pakistan. Pakistan had established diplomatic relations with these countries decades ago and they have become important bilateral development partners with a substantial assistance portfolio in social and economic sectors. Details of social and economic assistance provided by Paris Club are as under:

#### **UNITED KINGDOM (UK):**

The UK has a sizable development assistance programme in Pakistan. The total amount of development assistance provided by UK in the form of grant in the financial year 2018-19 stood at £ 65.2 million, (US\$ 81.65 million), including bilateral, multilateral and humanitarian assistance. UK provides grant assistance to Pakistan for Education, Health, Nutrition, Poverty Reduction, Stability & Growth, Humanitarian, Financial Inclusion and Skill Development, assistance for Benazir Income Support Program (BISP), Pakistan Poverty Alleviation Fund (PPAF) and State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) etc. Currently, the UK has 4 on-going on-budget projects.

#### a. Instruments of Cooperation:

The basis of relationship with the UK is the MOU signed in 1992 between the Governments of Pakistan and United Kingdom. Pakistan and UK entered into a long-term development assistance relationship in 2006 through the 10-year Development Partnership Arrangement (DPA). DPA reaffirmed the partnership between the two sides and laid down a joint vision to:

- Reduce poverty and achieve MDG's;
- Strengthen financial management and accountability;
- Respect international human rights obligations; and,
- Improve coordination between donors;
- 2. New draft Development Partnership Arrangement (DPA) proposed by UK-DFID is under consideration in consultation with all the relevant GoP stakeholders.

# b. UK's Activities during 2018-19:

The following amendment to the Activity Agreements of UK funded on-budget grant projects have been acknowledged/signed by EAD during 2018-19:

Amendment No.2 of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Education Sector Program worth £283.2
 million (US\$ 364.71 million) was signed on 2<sup>nd</sup> April, 2019.

• Amendment No.4 of Punjab Education Sector Programme II (PESP-II) worth £ 420.5 (US\$ 541.53 million) was signed on 17<sup>th</sup> April, 2019.

#### **Annual Bilateral Assistance Talks:**

The Pakistan – United Kingdom Annual Bilateral Assistance Talks 2019 were held in Islamabad on 22<sup>nd</sup> March, 2019. The session was co-chaired by Secretary EAD from Pakistan side and Ms. Joanna Reid, Head of DFID from UK side.

#### **MOU** with British Council:

Memorandum of Understanding between Pakistan & British Council was renewed for a term of another five years on 31<sup>st</sup> May, 2019. MOU aims to provide support in education field in Pakistan.

# **Future Areas of Cooperation:**

Future areas of cooperation between the two countries including Macroeconomic Stability, improve Conditions for High and Sustained Growth, Job Creation and Poverty Reduction.

# **Open Government Partnership (OGP):**

After intensive interaction with relevant stakeholders, EAD has finalized the National Action Plan (NAP) which is in the final stages of approval by the Federal Government.

# **ITALY:**

Republic of Italy has a long term development assistance programme in Pakistan. Italy has provided assistance to Pakistan in the priority areas i.e. Poverty Reduction and Rural Development, Technical and Vocational Training, Health, Education, Agriculture, Microfinance and Environment etc. Currently, Italy has 2 on-going on-budget project and 3 Pipeline projects.

# a. Instruments of Cooperation:

The basis of relationship with the Republic of Italy is the agreement signed in June 2001, on consolidation of Pakistan's debt. Governments of Pakistan and Italy signed a Joint Declaration on 14<sup>th</sup> July, 2005 for expansion of bilateral co-operation in the economic and commercial fields.

# b. Main Development Activities during 2018-19:

# i. Economic Transformation Initiative in Gilgit Baltistan (ETI):

Economic Transformation Initiative (ETI) is a program that aims to provide infrastructural support, capacity building and technical assistance to stakeholders in Gilgit-Baltistan. Italian Government agreed to join hands with IFAD for providing a soft loan of Euro 20.5 million. Financing Agreement of ETI in Gilgit-Baltistan has been signed by Pakistan and Italy on 8<sup>th</sup> August, 2019.

# ii. Pak-Italy 4th Joint Economic Commission (JEC):

The 4<sup>th</sup> of Pak-Italy JEC is scheduled to be held on 29<sup>th</sup> October, 2019. Federal Minister for Economic Affairs will co-chair the session from Pakistan side. Consultation with relevant GoP stakeholders is underway to finalize the agenda of JEC.

# **SWITZERLAND:**

The basis of donor relationship is the agreement signed in 1966 on Technical & Scientific Cooperation. Switzerland provides assistance for Poverty alleviation, empowering people by improving good governance and livelihoods and supporting disadvantaged population groups. Pak-Swiss Annual Bilateral Consultation are held annually in Pakistan. Currently, Switzerland provides aid to Pakistan through off-budget channels.

#### **SPAIN:**

Development Cooperation with Spain is currently dormant stages and there is only one project in the pipeline. Efforts are being made to reinvigorate cooperation between the two countries.

#### **EUROPEAN UNION:**

European Union has a sizable development assistance programme in Pakistan. The total amount of development assistance provided by EU in the form of grant till the year 2018 stands at Euro 1.85 Billion as given by EU including bilateral and humanitarian assistance. EU provides grant assistance for Rural Development, Natural Resource Management, and Education & Human Resource Development. Some of the non-focal areas of Pak-EU development cooperation are trade and economic cooperation, democracy, human rights, counter terrorism, security and humanitarian assistance.

# a. Instruments of Cooperation:

The basis of development assistance is the MoU signed in 1991 between the Commission of the European Commission and Pakistan. Another agreement entitled Cooperation Agreement was signed between Pakistan and European Commission in 2004. Since 2014, EU and Pakistan have signed the Multi Indicative Programme (2014-2020).

#### b. Overview of the Portfolio:

Currently, the EU has 22 on-going Off-Budget projects and 4 On-Budget projects.

The following Financing Agreements are in advanced stages of processing:

- Public Financial Management Support Programme-II (PFM-II) Total Financial Assistance for € 13 Million.
- Rule Of Law Support To Pakistan Total Financial Assistance for € 20 Million.

# c. Pakistan - EU Financing Agreements:

In December 2018, Pakistan and EUD signed three financing agreements i.e. "Support to Parliamentary Development in Pakistan (Euro 15 M), Growth for Rural Advancement and Rural Sustainable Progress (Euro 50 M), and Development through Enhanced Education Programme, (Euro 50 M)".

#### d. Current Activities:

Both sides engage through various institutional arrangements including Programming Steering Committee meetings, Biannual Portfolio Review meetings and other engagements to discuss progress on on-going projects. Recently, Portfolio Review of all EU-funded projects was held in the EAD.

- 2 Programming Steering Committee (PSC) The PSC offers a major forum for portfolio review between the two sides.
- 3. EU-Pakistan 9<sup>th</sup> Joint Commission The 9<sup>th</sup> Joint Commission between Pakistan and EU was held in Islamabad from 13 16 November, 2018. It served as a forum to discuss future areas of cooperation, recent economic and political developments in Pakistan and the EU provided an opportunity to address outstanding issues. The next session is scheduled to be held in Brussels from 13-15 November, 2019.

# e. Future Areas of Cooperation:

- Rehabilitation of people from FATA and Balochistan who are now being brought forward to ensure equal participation and inclusive growth in Pakistan.
- Cooperation in sectors of Human Resource Development through initiatives in Education and Skills Development as Pakistan has a youth bulge and the need to not only create jobs but ensure that young men and women are skilled and employable.
- Strengthening SME's to help them find a voice in competitive markets.

#### **GERMANY:**

Pakistan has been a recipient of German Development Assistance since the founding of German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development in 1961. The two sides celebrated the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of development cooperation in 2011. The total development assistance encompassing both technical and financial cooperation since 1961 amounts to € 109.1 million. The volume of development assistance and priority areas are identified through biennial Negotiations between BMZ and Economic Affairs Division, held alternately in Berlin and Islamabad. The focus of development cooperation has largely been on KP, FATA and Punjab. Projects in other areas in the past pertain to Strengthening Civil Law Enforcement in Sindh, Rehabilitation of Vocational Training Centers in Quetta, Baluchistan Water Supply, Water and Sanitation Extension Program in Gilgit-Baltistan etc.

- 2. Assistance is focused on the following sectors:
  - i. Good governance
  - ii. Renewable energy and energy efficiency
  - iii. Basic education/vocational training
  - iv. Health
- 3. The German government stands committed to remaining engaged in cross-cutting issues such as gender equality, human rights, corruption and climate change. It also plans to continue support to multilateral organizations, German political foundations, NGOs and private-sector organizations working in these areas.

# a. Instrument of Cooperation:

Bilateral Agreement on Technical Cooperation between Pakistan and Federal Republic of Germany, signed in 1972, forms the basis of bilateral cooperation.

#### b. Overview of Portfolio:

Currently, Germany has 19 on-budget and 18 off-budget projects. The following Financing Agreements are in advanced stages of processing.

- Technical Cooperation 2017 Total Financial Assistance for € 23.4 million
- Technical Cooperation 2018 Total Financial Assistance for € 4 million
- Financial Cooperation 2018 Total Financial Assistance for € 19.5 million
- 2. EAD signed the following FA's in 2018-19:
  - Polio Eradication Programme Phase-II (Euro 5 M)
  - Financial Cooperation Agreement-2016 (Euro 58.8 M) (Loan € 26.8 million & Grant € 31.9 million)
  - Financial Cooperation Agreement-2017 (Euro 22.4 M)
  - Social Health Protection Phase II KP € 9.4 M & GB € 2.6 M (Euro 12 M)
- 3. Government to Government (G2G) Consultations The EAD recently, hosted a German delegation in Islamabad on November 22, 2018 for G2G Consultations. These are held as a preparatory measure to discuss future areas of cooperation, new ideas and proposals for the G2G Negotiations.
- 4. Government to Government (G2G) Negotiations The Secretary EAD chaired the Government to Government Negotiations, 2019 which were held in Berlin on September 11-12- 2019. These are held to discuss the future areas of cooperation and new commitments. The Federal Republic of Germany committed over € 100 Million for Development Cooperation with Pakistan. The German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development committed the new additional funding in three sectors:
  - Good Governance,
  - Energy
  - Sustainable Economic Development
- 5. The new funds will be allocated to different projects including the Billion tree afforestation project, resilience against natural disasters, local governance, revenue generation and support to people affected by migration and displacement, promotion of renewable energies and better energy efficiency, social health protection and provision of health services and improving social and labour standards.
- 6. The Pakistani delegation briefed the German counterparts about new development priorities of the Pakistani Government including a stronger focus on transparency, institutional

reforms, poverty alleviation, human development and green energy. Both sides exchanged views how to increase the cost effectiveness of development assistance and how to enhance cooperation with the private sector.

# **FRANCE:**

France, as a member of Aid to Pakistan Consortium, has been extending development assistance to Pakistan since 1961. The bilateral economic cooperation revived with the 2008 meeting of Friends of Democratic Pakistan. Cooperation with France is taking place under the "Joint Declaration on Economic and Commercial partnership" signed in May 2011 between the Governments of Pakistan and France.

2. France carries out its development activities mostly through the French Development Agency (AFD). AFD is a public financial institution that implements the policy defined by the French government, and was founded in 1998. Government of Pakistan granted permission to AFD and its subsidiary PROPARCO, a development finance company for the private sector, to establish their office in Pakistan on 02-12-2008.

# A. Overview of the Portfolio:

An overview of AFD portfolio is as under:-

- 2. AFD has been involved in development activities in Pakistan since 2007. In 2019, the total portfolio of AFD funded projects amounted to Euro 723.86 million as soft loan, out of which  $\in$  553.36 is reserved for ongoing and  $\in$  170.5 million is for projects in the pipeline. There are a total of twelve (12) projects (9 ongoing and 3 pipeline projects).p
  - The total disbursement under the AFD portfolio in 2018-19 stood at € 144.53 million mainly in energy and power sectors.

# c. Instruments of Cooperation:

Pakistan and France have upgraded the Administrative Economic and Trade Committee (AETC) to the level of the Joint Economic Commission (JEC). Its first meeting is expected to be held in France in 2019.

# d. Future Area of Cooperation:

AFD is currently supporting Pakistan mainly in Environment and Energy sectors. Potential areas for cooperation in future are the renewable Energy, Energy Efficiency, Urban Mobility and Sanitation sectors.

#### **RUSSIA:**

Cooperation with Russia is taking place under the "Agreement between Pakistan and Russia on Trade and Economic Cooperation" signed in April 1999. Pakistan and Russia reviewed their bilateral development and trade cooperation and agreed to establish an Inter-Governmental Commission (IGC) on Trade, Economic, Scientific and Technical Cooperation in March, 2000.

# a. Instruments of Cooperation:

- 5<sup>th</sup> session of Pak-Russia Inter Governmental Commission (IGC) on Trade, Economic, Scientific and Technical Cooperation was held on November 28-30, 2017 at Moscow, Russia.
- 6<sup>th</sup> Session of Pak-Russia Inter Governmental Commission (IGC) is to be held on 3<sup>rd</sup> December, 2019 in Islamabad.

# b. Future Area of Cooperation:

Potential areas for cooperation in future are Defense, Energy, Industries & Production, Trade & Investment, Transport & Logistics, Cyber Security, and Education & Professional Training.

# **NORWAY:**

Norway Joined Pakistan Development Forum (PDF) in 1969 formally known as Aid to Pakistan Consortium and since then has been providing assistance to Pakistan.

# a. Overview of the Portfolio:

Earlier, Pakistan and Norway worked together in the areas of Energy, Education, Environment, Telecommunication Sector and Human Rights. Now Norwegian Government provides assistance to GoP in areas of basic Education and Capacity Building only.

# **b.** Type of Non-Government Assistance:

Norwegian Government provides grant assistance which is completely off-budget and disbursed through INGO's and UN agencies.

The Government of Pakistan, through Economic Affairs Division, signed a Grant Agreement, with total worth of NOK 217.6 million with the Government of Norway during the period 2003 to 2012 in areas as education and governance.

# c. Future Areas of Cooperation:

Norway has good expertise in hydropower and can extend cooperation to Pakistan in this sector.

# UNITED STATE OF AMERICA (USA)

United States of America (USA) is providing economic assistance principally through Economic Support Fund (ESF) for social sector development in Pakistan. ESF has been managed through different bilateral instruments signed with USA. These include the Strategic Objective Grant Agreement (SOGA) 2001, Pakistan Enhanced Partnership Agreement (PEPA) 2010, Unilateral (Cash transfers to BISP, ERRA, Citizen Damage Compensation Program etc and International Narcotics and Law Enforcement – Pakistan 1982 (INL-P).

# a. INTERNATIONAL NARCOTICS AND LAW ENFORCEMENT-PAKISTAN (INL-P):

The Embassy of the USA has been extending financing facility for continuation of projects like Drug Interdiction, Rule of Law, and crop control. For this, a Letter of Agreement (LoA) was signed with the International Narcotics and Law Enforcement-Pakistan (INL-P) in 1982. Till now, 78 revisions to the LoA have been signed wherein a total US \$ 842.2 million has been provided.

2. During 2018-19, US wing of EAD has acknowledged 10 Project Implementation Letters (PILs) of INL-P, US Embassy, Islamabad total worth of US\$ 83.05 million.

# Programme of activities and target under process:

Amendment/Revision No. 79 of the Letter of Agreement, 1982 in which INL-P, US Embassy spells out their yearly program for on-going/ pipeline projects.

#### b. USAID:

The USAID provides economic assistance in two modes i.e. On-budget (G2G) and Off-budget (Non G2G). On-budget assistance is provided through Government of Pakistan whereas Off-budget assistance is channeled through INGO's and Implementing Partners of the USAID which are mostly for-profit companies based in USA, and are selected independently. During the period US wing, EAD has acknowledged 6 amendments to the Activity Agreement and PILs total worth US\$ 31.3million.

#### c. AUSTRALIA:

During 2018-19, Economic Affairs Division issued NoC regarding the project titled "Enhancing small Ruminant Production to Benefit Farming Families in Sindh and Punjab, Pakistan". It is stated that the said project of technical cooperation will be executed under

Australian Center for International Agriculture Research (ACIAR) in the field of agriculture research and development. The aim of the said project is to improve the livelihoods and wellbeing of small ruminant farming families, focusing on the inclusion of women, by developing strategies for improved, sustainable production and value chain engagement.

2. In 2018-19, Australia offered nearly 40 Australia Awards Scholarships to Pakistani citizens, and at least half, for women. Fifty percent of these are reserved for public policy practitioners, reformers and leaders. Scholarship will also be awarded to professionals working in civil society and the private sector.

# d. GLOBAL AFFAIRS, CANADA:

Government of Canada writes off eligible expenditure based on its verification and approval of Project's Bi-national Steering Committee (BSC) on annual basis. So far BSC in its last eleven (11) meetings has approved Rs. 6,680.97 million for write-off for the period of 2006-17, details of which are as under:

- 2. The remaining amount of Rs. 301.84 million will be written-off after verification of the expenditure for FY 2018-19 and 2019-20. Presently, verification of expenditure for FY 2018-19 is underway based on which write-off proposals will be finalized and submitted by the Canadian side to next meeting of BSC for approval.
- 3. During 2018-19, Global Affairs, Canada has informed that they are adopting a Feminist International Assistance Policy that seeks to eradicate poverty and build a more peaceful, more inclusive and more prosperous world. Canada firmly believes that promoting gender equality and empowering women and girls is the most effective approach to achieving this goal. It is an off-budget program.

# MULTILATERAL ORGANIZATIONS/ DEVELOPMENT PARTNERS

# ASIAN DEVELOPMENT BANK (ADB)

Asian Development Bank (ADB) is a multilateral development bank owned by 68 countries including 49 from Asia and the Pacific region and 19 from other parts of the world. ADB's main instruments for helping its developing member countries are policy dialogue, loans, equity investments, guarantees, grants, and technical assistance.

2. Pakistan is one of the founding members of the Asian Development Bank since 1966. ADB has since worked with the Government of Pakistan to strengthen the country's key infrastructure, social services, and economic growth. ADB helps to address Pakistan's development needs for energy, transport, agriculture, natural resources, rural development, water supply, urban infrastructure & services, public sector management, and finance. ADB's cumulative disbursement stands at \$22.8 billion for Pakistan.

#### a. Portfolio Performance:

ADB's ongoing portfolio is USD 6.14 billion for 33 projects in Energy, Road & Transport, Water & Agriculture, Urban Development, Public-Private Partnerships, Disaster Reduction & Social Sector. ADB disbursed an amount of US\$ 541 million for on-going projects in FY 2018-19.

# **Major Events:**

- i. Pakistan participated in the 17<sup>th</sup> Central Asia Regional Economic Cooperation (CAREC) Ministerial Conference held in Ashgabat, Turkmenistan on 15<sup>th</sup> November 2018. The Ministerial Conference functions as a high-level strategy-setting and policy body. It provides overall strategic guidance and serves as a platform to discuss and debate important policy and strategic issues of regional relevance.
- ii. The 52<sup>nd</sup>Annual Meeting of the Board of Governors of Asian Development Bank (ADB) was held in Nadi, Fiji from 1–6 May, 2019. A high-level Pakistani delegation comprising of Dr. Ishrat Husain, Advisor to the Prime Minister on Institutional Reforms & Austerity as Governor ad-Interim / Head of Delegation, Mr. Noor Ahmed, Secretary EAD / Alternate Governor, attended the Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting of the BOGs is an opportunity to provide guidance on the ADB's administrative, financial and operational matters. ADB's annual meetings have become a premier forum for the discussion of economic and social development issues in Asia and the Pacific region.

# ISLAMIC DEVELOPMENT BANK (IsDB)

IsDB is an International Financial Institution, established in 1975 with the aim to foster economic development and social progress of 57 Muslim member countries in accordance with the principles of Shari'ah. IsDB's total project portfolio during 2018-19 for Pakistan was US\$ 265.28 million, out of which an amount of US\$ 9.689 million was disbursed by the IsDB during 2018-19.

- 2. The Member Country Partnership Strategy (MCPS) is a detailed document of IsDB through which the strategic thrust of the IsDB Vision 1440H (2020) was aligned with development priorities of the GOP. MCPS (2012-17) Group Strategy was developed based on extensive consultations with key stakeholders in Pakistan including Federal and Provincial Governments, private sector, business community and civil society. The resource envelope of US\$ 2.75 billion available under the strategy is distributed among three pillars i.e. the infrastructure sector envisaged to receive the majority share of 50% (energy 30% and transport 20%) followed by agriculture and rural development 20% and human development 15% (education 8% and health 7%). The allocated amount has been fully utilized by GOP during the period of 2013-17. The overall implementation of the MCPS is 137% (i.e. approval of US\$ 3.768 billion against US\$ 2.75 billion indicative financing by IsDB Group. The next MCPS for the period of 2020-22 is expected for negotiation with IsDB during the first quarter of year 2020. During the year 2018-19, under the IsDB financing an agreement amounting to US\$ 35 million for CASA-1000 project was signed on 17-03-2019.
- 3. In addition to the loans, following two TA Grant amounting to US\$ 0.56 million were also provided by IsDB during the year 2018-19.

4. Moreover, 8 Medical Mobile Units for Rural Areas of Pakistan worth US\$ 27 million were also donated by the Bank during the financial year 2018-19. The Mobile Units have been allocated for the 5 districts of Sindh & Khyber Pakhtunkhwa provinces.

# INTERNATIONAL ISLAMIC TRADE FINANCE CORPORATION (ITFC):

On the successful completion of the 1<sup>st</sup> Framework Agreement (2015-2017), a new Framework Agreement was signed with ITFC on April 05, 2018. Under the new Framework agreement ITFC will make its best efforts to mobilize financial resources amounting to US\$ 4.5 billion during the coming three years 2018-2020 (US\$ 1.5 billion on yearly basis). Under the new Framework Agreement following three agreements amounting to US\$ 926 million were signed for import of oil & LNG during the year 2018-19.

# **OPEC FUND FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (OFID):**

OFID started its operations in August 1976 and became a full-fledged permanent international development agency in May 1980. Its main aim is to foster social and economic progress in the developing world through provision of concessional financing.

2. OFID's total Project Portfolio was US\$ 130 million. An amount of US\$ 8.45 million has been disbursed during 2018-19.

# **UNITED NATIONS (UN)**

UN System for sustainable economic development and social uplift through efficient, effective and transparent interventions of UN Agencies under the national ownership. Economic Affairs Division (EAD), on behalf of the Government of Pakistan, coordinates with the achievements of Government of Pakistan since August, 2018 are as follows:-

# a. Formulation of the Country Programme Documents:

The Country Programme Documents (CPDs) of the UN Agencies namely; UNICEF, UNFPA, WFP and UNDP were formulated and finalized with the respective UN Agencies after extensive meetings and deliberations to align them with GoP vision 2025. In this regard, series of consultations were held with the Federal and Provincial governments as well as the UN agencies.

# b. Signing of OP-III/UNSDF:

The One UN Programme-III (2018-22) was finalized between UN System and Government of Pakistan in April, 2018 with a total budget of US \$ 1.4 billion for 25 years. The document was developed by working closely with federal, provincial and regional government, key donors and wide spectrum of civil society actors. The OP-III encompasses ten outcome areas around which the UN System will develop its Joint Work Plans for 2018-22 period. Each outcome reflects priorities jointly identified by the UN and the Government of Pakistan, based on areas in which the UN has a strong comparative advantage. The ten outcomes are the foundation of the UNSDF/OP-III (2018-2022). The outcomes are listed below:-

- Economic Growth
- Decent Work
- ➤ Health & WASH
- Nutrition
- ➤ Food Security and Sustainable Agriculture
- > Resilience
- ➤ Education & Learning
- Gender Equality and Dignity
- ➢ Governance
- Social Protection
- 2. The progress on the above mentioned objectives is to be tracked from time to time. For this progress check, the concept of an Oversight Committee is introduced in the One UN Programme. The Oversight Committee (OC) is chaired by Secretary, EAD along with the United Nations Resident Coordinator (UNRC). The stakeholders include federal and provincial

governments, civil society member and the donors. The OC needs to meet twice a year. Recently, EAD held the meeting of the Oversight Committee on 10<sup>th</sup> June, 2019.

# c. Capacity Development of Government Officers through Foreign Training Committee:

As part of Government manifesto of capacity development of Government officers Economic Affairs Division played a proactive role and for the FY 2018 a total of 1,078 (One Thousand and Seventy-Eight only) officers were nominated in 396 (three hundred and ninety six only) courses. These officials were sent abroad from various Ministries/Division/Departments in short and long term training courses in various disciplines. Apart from this UN Wing has also sent innumerable officers from various Ministries/Divisions/Departments on trainings/workshops/seminars offered by UNESCAP in Bangkok, Thailand.

# WORLD BANK (WB)

The World Bank Group comprises of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) and its affiliates, the International Development Association (IDA), the International Finance Corporation (IFC), The International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes (ICSID), and Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA). The World Bank Wing deals with the financial and technical assistance from the World Bank Group and International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD).

- 2. Economic Affairs Division (EAD) and World Bank (WB) have jointly prepared the Country Partnership Strategy (CPS) 2015-19 (extended upto 2020) which focuses on transforming the energy sector, supporting private sector development, breaking through "good enough" barrier on services, reaching out to the underserved neglected and poor, and leveraging regional markets. Under the CPS, the World Bank has agreed to provide financial support to the tune of US\$ 8.7 billion (approximately US\$ 2.0 billion under IBRD and US\$ 6.7 billion under IDA).
- 3. EAD has signed Sindh Solar Energy Project of US\$ 100.00 million, Pakistan Raises Revenue Program of US\$ 400.00 million, Assisting Governance and Access in Higher Education for Quality Enhancement Program of US\$ 400.00 million, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Revenue Mobilization and Public Resource Management Program of US\$118.0 million and an advance of US\$ 4.00 million for conducting feasibilities for Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Hydro Power Projects, with the World Bank during FY 2018-19.
- 4. EAD also negotiated first phase of Karachi Water and Sewerage Services Improvement Project of US\$ 40.0 million, Karachi Urban Mobility Project of US\$ 382.00 million, Competitive and Livable City of Karachi of US\$ 230.00 million, Additional Financing for CASA-1000 Project of US\$ 65.00 million, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Irrigated Agriculture and Rural Development Project of US\$ 171.00 million, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Integrated Tourism Project of US\$ 70.00 million and. These projects will formally be signed with World Bank in early FY 2020.
- 5. The World Bank's commitments for ongoing projects for Pakistan remained at US\$ 9.20 billion, out of which an amount of US\$ 650.00 million was disbursed by the World Bank during FY 2018-19 (**Annex-III**). Pakistan paid contribution of US\$1.57 million towards IDA-18 Replenishment during FY 2018-19.
- 6. International Finance Corporation (IFC) provides support to private sector development in Pakistan. IFC planned to invest US\$ 3.5 to 4.2 billion in Pakistan during the CPS period.

IFC's committed investment exposure (own account) in Pakistan, as of June, 2019 was US\$ 1.30 billion in 40 companies. IFC committed around US\$ 337.00 million funding to support (i) Engro Polymer (US\$35 million, debt) (ii) Shifa International Hospital (US\$19.00 million equity); and (iii) US\$ 283.00 million in short-term trade finance with 11 local banks.

- 7. The Multi-Donor Trust Fund (MDTF) for KP/FATA and Balochistan was established for restoration of economic and social assets and activities in crisis affected areas by improving local governance and service delivery, provincial economic management capacity and community driven initiatives. Under the Multi Donor Trust Fund (Round-I), being administered by the World Bank, total projects undertaken were of worth US\$ 147.1 million. The MDTF moved onto to Round-II during FY2017 after benefitting approximately 5.7 million people under Round-I. Till date, thirteen contributing partners have pledged US\$275.0 million.
- 8. Under MDTF Round-II an amount of US\$ 385.6 million would be required (KP 40%, FATA 35% and Balochistan 25%) for growth and job creation, policy reforms and governance & service delivery projects. So far, US\$124.00 million are made available for MDTF Round-II. Currently six (6) projects worth US\$ 103.00 million are ongoing under MDTF Round-II. EAD signed Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Digital Jobs Project of US\$ 2.00 million (grant) with World Bank during FY2019. Similarly, EAD negotiated additional financing of US\$15.00 million (grant) for ongoing project titled Early Recovery Program for Temporarily Displaced People of Erstwhile FATA with the World Bank during FY 2018-19. One project titled "FATA Rural Livelihoods and Infrastructure" has been closed during FY2018-19. The World Bank has disbursed an amount of US\$ 12.79 million during FY2018-19 under MDTF projects (Annex-III-A).

# INTERNATIONAL FUND FOR AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT (IFAD):

The International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) is a membership based international financial institution with a mandate focused exclusively on eradicating rural poverty through low-interest loans and grants. IFAD works with governments to develop and finance programmes that enable the rural poor people to overcome poverty. IFAD operations in Pakistan are guided by the government's strategies and initiatives for rural poverty reduction and an IFAD Country Strategy called Country Strategic Opportunities Program (COSOP). Pakistan being one of the founding members of IFAD had pledged US\$ 9.00 million for 11<sup>th</sup> Replenishment. Presently total commitment from IFAD for Pakistan is US\$ 242.10 million out of which an amount of US\$ 18.50 million was disbursed by IFAD during 2018-19 (Annex-III-B). Pakistan paid contribution of US\$ 2.192 million towards 10<sup>th</sup> Replenishment of IFAD Resources during FY 2018-19.

# ECONOMIC COOPERATION WITH DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

# **ECONOMIC COOPERATION (EC)**

Economic Cooperation (EC) is responsible for Bilateral Economic Cooperation, which is mainly undertaken through an institutional mechanism in the form of Joint Ministerial Commissions (JMC), Joint Economic Commissions (JEC), Inter Governmental Commissions (IGC) and Joint Commissions (JC). Besides, EC Wing coordinates the Official Development Assistance (ODA) from the Gulf Region (Saudi Arabia), Oman, UAE (Abu Dhabi), Kuwait and Korea (through Korean International Cooperation Agency-KOICA) as well as concessional loans from Economic Development Cooperation Fund (EDCF) of the Republic of Korea for financing various development projects in Pakistan.

- 2. EC Wing also administers Pakistan Technical Assistance Programme (PTAP), which provides long-term educational facilities and short-term trainings in various fields to more than fifty friendly developing countries as well as to overseas Pakistanis.
- 3. Activities undertaken by EC Wing during the financial year 2018-19 are given below:

# a. Joint Ministerial Commissions (JMCs) Bilateral Consultations:

- i. 4<sup>th</sup> session of Pak-Kuwait, Joint Ministerial Commission (JMC) held on 27-28 September, 2018 in Islamabad.

# **RESEARCH & STATISTICS**

## RESEARCH AND STATISTICS (R&S)

Many developing countries including Pakistan do not have sufficient funds to provide public goods such as education, health, transportation, clean water or waste disposal facilities. Although such goods are essential for socio-economic development, their economic rate of return is so uncertain that private investors are unwilling to provide them on a large scale. Foreign aid can substitute for private capital in those instances, providing the funds for investment in public goods that the international capital market either will not supply to Pakistan or would supply at a high interest rate. In principle foreign aid could be a major source of capital, fueling the Pakistan's economic growth and helping to promote socio-economic and human development.

2. Our major development partners such as World Bank, Asian Development Bank, Islamic Development Bank, China, Japan, and France are providing Foreign Economic Assistance (FEA) in the form for project and non-project aid. Details of FEA provided during the FY 2018-19 are as under:

#### a. Aid Inflow:


Substantial aid inflows i.e. commitments and disbursements of foreign economic assistance took place during FY 2018-19. EAD maintains systematic record of commitments and disbursements in the shape of "Status Report on Commitments and Disbursements of Foreign Economic Assistance". It is prepared on quarterly basis and is designed to satisfy the diverse needs of different stakeholders.

#### **b.** Commitments:

Total commitments of foreign economic assistance by the various donors amounted to US\$ 12,653.94 million during FY 2018-19. It includes:

- a) Loans amounting to US\$ 12,431.59 million; and
- b) Grants amounting to US\$ 222.35 million

#### i. Source-Wise Commitments:

Commitments from Bilateral sources were higher than that of the Multilateral sources. Multilateral sources committed an amount of US\$ 2,644 million while commitments from Bilateral sources were US\$ 3,446 million. Similarly US\$ 4,564 were committed from commercial banks and US\$ 2,000 million were committed as Safe deposits<sup>1</sup> during the FY 2018-19. Break-up is given as under:

- b. In the multilateral group, World Bank with commitments of US\$ 1,019 million was the largest contributor. Other major contributors were IDB [US\$ 926 million] and ADB [US\$ 492 million].
- c. Commitments of US\$ 3,446 million from the bilateral sources consisted of US\$ 3,388 million loans and US\$ 58 million grants;
- d. In the bilateral group, Saudi Arabia with commitments of US\$ 3,256.148 million was the largest donor.




Figure 3 Commitments from Major Donors

Commitments for the Project Aid (US\$ 1,862 million) were lower than that for the Non Project Aid (US\$ 10,792 million) during the period under review.




Figure 4 Project vs Non Project aid





- a. Disbursements from the multilateral sources were dominated by loans which were about 96% of total disbursements from multilateral sources;
- b. 13% disbursements from the bilateral sources came in the shape of grants while 87% were loans;
- c. Share of multilateral and bilateral sources was 20% and 19% respectively in the total disbursements. Safe deposits and commercial banks contributed 19% and 42% respectively of the total disbursement;
- d. In the bilateral group, major disbursements were from China [US\$ 1,573 million], USA [US\$ 101 million], France [US\$ 88 million], UK [US\$ 86 million], Japan [US\$70 million] and Saudi Arabia [US\$ 72 million]
- e. Among Multilateral agencies, IDB was the largest partner by dirbusring US 819 million followed by the World Bank [US\$ 652 million] and ADB [US\$ 535] out of the total US\$ 2,108 million.



# DEBT MANAGEMENT

#### **DEBT SERVICING**

EAD is responsible for making timely debt servicing (principal repayments and interest payments) of foreign loans. Actual debt servicing of foreign loans during financial year 2018-19 amounted to \$9,121 million, comprising \$8,947 million central loans and \$174 million guaranteed loans. Central loans were about 98.09% of the total debt servicing of external loans. Out of the total debt servicing of \$9,121 million, comprising \$7,054 million principal repayments and \$2,067 million interest payments. About 18.26% (\$1,666 million) of the total debt servicing went to the bilateral creditors and 69.31% (6,322 million) to the multilateral creditors. about 87.58% (7,988 million) was against the medium- and long-term loans while 12.43% (1,134 million) was against the short-term loans. A summarized view of the total debt servicing (central + guaranteed) is tabulated below, while details are at Annex-V.

#### **COMPUTER CENTRE**


